A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, MARK MAHONEY:

Arrangements are being made with the Greenwich Rod and Gun Club to host High School Skeet clubs with the Greenwich, Salem and Cambridge schools. The program will be for Youth shooters in the 10th and 11th grades. Instruction and coaching will be accomplished by certified 4 H shooting sports instructors who are also Owlkill club members. The program will be indemnified by the Cornell Extension service. Funding for the program will be by the Greenwich Rod and Gun Club.



TRIVIA

Last month's question – lots of responses! Thank you to Mark Mahoney, Joe Ahrberg, John Wiley, and Rich Allen for your responses! Here were the questions:

1. Hunting: What was a "punt gun" and why was it banned?

A "punt gun" was a huge shotgun, often mounted right on a small boat and was used for duck hunting; okay, more like used for commercial harvesting of duck. It could literally take a flock right off the water. It was decided that there was nothing sportsmanlike at all in its use and it could result in the extinction of types of wild duck.

2. Military: The 1860 Henry repeating rifle was one of the first lever action rifles used in combat. One of the employees at Henry was Oliver Winchester, who later created the Winchester 1866. It introduced two major and practical improvements over the 1860. What were those improvements and what was the practical benefit?

Improvements in the Winchester 1866 – more conventional ammunition (the 1860 used a proprietary rimfire round); handguard over the barrel (kept dirt out of the spring magazine and protected the hand from burning on a hot barrel); spring actuated loading door on the right side of the receiver (made it far easier to load from under cover or in the prone position than loading at the end of the barrel).

3. Presidents: Name a President awarded the Medal of Honor; a President awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross; a President awarded the Legion of Merit; and two Presidents awarded the World War I Victory Medal.

Medal of Honor – Col. Theodore Roosevelt; DFC – Lt. George H.W. Bush; Legion of Merit – Gen. Dwight Eisenhower; and WWI Victory Medal – CPT Harry Truman and Gen. Dwight Eisenhowever.

This month's questions:

Movies (this is for our Secretary and resident classic movie buff, "The Duke"): In the classic Boer War drama "Breaker Morant" (1980), an Australian officer was tried for unlawfully executing insurgents. When asked by what authority he executed the prisoners, he declared "Rule three-oh-three!" To what was he likely referring?

Military: US Marines have a number of nicknames, but one of the most enduring is "leatherneck." To what does this refer?

The Americans rapidly ditched the wool uniforms and replaced them with tropical uniforms imported from Hong Kong...
