#### **TRIVIA**


Last month's questions – and thanks to John Wiley and Rich Allen for their answer submissions! Last month's topics were Fish, Senators, and Music! Here's the answers....

First of all, fish.



This bugger, known colloquially as the "Frankenfish" started to greatly concern those who ran aquaculture farms in Florida because it is quite the predator when it encounters fresh fish stocks. What is it actually called?
