### **REMINDER ABOUT NEW MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL POLICIES/FORMS FOR 2016**

We published this last month – but its that important, folks...

- 1. Dues and renewals are due no later than the 1<sup>st</sup> of March. On that day, the combo to the clubhouse and ranges changes.
- 2. Renewals received between 1<sup>st</sup> of March and 1<sup>st</sup> of June have a \$20.00 penalty.
- 3. Renewals received after the 1<sup>st</sup> of June will be treated as a new membership, which means that the applicant will have to appear before the Board of Directors' Meeting and then the next Membership meeting before approval.

Please understand – the goal is not that we want to collect penalties or have anyone jump through hoops. #### **TRIVIA**

No answers to this past month's trivia question!!!

As you may recall last month's question.... John Browning, designer of the famous Colt 1911 ".45 Auto" was later commissioned to produce a pistol for the French Army. Of course, he'd signed his patents over to Colt for his auto pistol design, so he had to start from scratch in some ways. He died in 1926 before the design was complete. What was the pistol that he came up with, and who finished the design after his passing? Hint – the alternative French name for the pistol they wanted was "Grand Puissance."

The pistol, of course, was the Browning Hi-Power. John Browning passed away as he was finishing the



new semi-automatic pistol. The design was finally finished in 1934 by an organization that has had a long relationship with Browning – Fabrique National (FN) (see November's trivia column for more information on the relationship). The Hi-Power has had a long and distinguished history, and has a relationship with Europe's militaries very similar to our relationship with the Colt 1911. Much like the 1911, this pistol is still seen in service with military and police organizations throughout the world.

So – this month's question. The .45 ACP Thompson Submachine gun, famed for its use by organized crime and police through the 1920s (with its trademark drum magazine and cliché violin case), and later by British and American soldiers during World War II (Americans with stick magazines, generally) was an elegant design though maintenance intensive, heavy as a Garand, and expensive to manufacture. It was replaced

by a decidedly inelegant design at the end of the war – but cheap and easy to manufacture, primarily of stamped metal. This piece stayed in the inventory through the 1980s. What was the replacement for the Thompson? And what was its odd (though appropriate) nickname?

Semper Fidelis! 70 years ago – Marines advancing on Okinawa, May 1945. The Marine in the foreground has the Thompson Submachine Gun. The Marine on the right carries the Browning Automatic Rifle (BAR).
