
TRIVIA

Last month's trivia question didn't get much response – much like the Remington product that was its subjet. Lets revisit the question: Technology can be a blessing, making our lives easier. However, it comes at a cost. Sometimes the cost is simply finding that something that we thought would make a simple task easier instead just makes a simple task more complicated, and the user ends up serving the technology as opposed to the other way around. Sometimes it becomes a solution in search of a problem.


Well, Remington found a solution after lots of time and dollars sunk into a revolutionary new system they called the Etronix, and even released a new Model 700 designed to take advantage of the system (granted, with a two thousand dollar MSRP). Well, this hit the market in 2000, and was gone by 2003. So this month's question is – what the heck was Remington Etronix, and why was it gone by 2003? Well, the

Etronix was a solution in search of a problem. Squeezing the trigger should result in a "bang" about a millisecond or two later, right? Well, that millisecond can be eliminated if we avoid the chemical reaction of ignition, and instead have electronic ignition of the round. Hence Etronix. Electronic primers should ignite instantaneously upon the circuit being completed, right? Well, it sure worked. Except that no one was interested. Of course, Remington made mistakes in marketing it too. For instance, the people who felt that the efficiencies gained in electronic primers were going to boost their accuracy were not going to buy the low end Remingtons that were fitted with the Etronix. Rather, the people who are impressed with the small increase in accuracy tend to go for the higher end Remingtons, like the 40X. Yet, the high end rifles were not fitted with Etronix. So, within three years, Remington quietly withdrew this experiment from the market.

Hat's off to Mark Mahoney, who did a bit of research to find the answer on this one...



LEFT: Diagram of the Etronix mechanism mounted in a Remington 700.




LEFT: Diagram of the Etronix electronic ignition primer.

So, now for this month's question. The Ruger #1 is one of the most popular single shot rifles in the world. I have one in 45-70, and I love it. Its classy, elegant, and tough as nails. Now in production for about 50 years, its mechanism and look harken back to a simpler time, the 1880s, when the Winchester High and Low-Wall rifles were kings of the single shot world. In addition to a simple design, these type of "falling block" rifle actions are also extremely sturdy and can handle a very powerful load. One would think that the Ruger would be based on the Winchester, but actually its design is based on one which pre-dates the Winchester by at least ten years. What rifle was it based on?



British explorer and hunter Frederick Courtney Selous (1851-1917) in the 1890s. Check out the rifle on the right - is that a Ruger #1? Well, if this were 70 years later, maybe. But Mr. Ruger no doubt drew a lot of inspiration for his famous single shot rifle from the firearm on the right. What is it?
