TRIVIA

Last month's topics: meteorology, history, and handguns! Thanks to Rich Allen again for his answers, good to see you back in the game, Rich! So last month's questions:

Meteorology for two points. In dry places like Death Valley, California, snow can transform into penitents. What is a penitent (or penitente)?

While I first thought the word was another word for prisoner (as in a penitentiary), in fact it is an interesting meteorological phenomenon in very dry air... A penitente is a closely compacted formation of "blades" of snow or ice found in dry areas and high altitudes which point in the general direction upward at the sun. For instance, like this one made of glacial ice:



Now history for three. New York's Christman Bird and Wildlife Sanctuary can trace its founding to what significant New York weather event?

This Schenectady County landmark's origins go back to the Blizzard of '88 (1888 that is), at the time one of the worst blizzards on record to strike the New York area. This fearsome blizzard, with deep snow and heavy winds, blanketed New York City, Albany, Saratoga, and many other parts of the Northeast. W.W. Christman began a winter feeding program for birds that year because of their inability to find food in the heavily snow blanketed outdoors. Their project grew into a 105-acre sanctuary which is utilized to this day.

Handguns – one point. Russian Cosmonauts carried handguns with them in space. From 1986-2006 they carried a specific model called the TP-82. Why?

After several space capsules landed way off course after re-entry, a cosmonaut suggested replacing the 9mm pistol in their survival kit with something more substantial to defend against the significantly larger wildlife they could encounter in the Siberian wilderness.

Bonus – one more point. The TP-82 had an unusual characteristic for a handgun. What was it?

The TP-82 had three barrels – two upper smoothbore barrels for shooting 40 gauge rounds, and a lower barrel that could shoot 5.45x39 ammo. In addition, the removable buttstock held a machete. Meet the TP-82:



Okay – so on to this month's questions:

1. "Hunting" for 100:

Interestingly, these bucks and does are considered "small game."

2. The Great Outdoors" for 100:

What is the name for a piece of dry land or trail that a boat or canoe is carried over between two bodies of water?

3. "Military History" for 300:

The Vietnam War is often treated as a war with four parties – North and South Vietnamese, Viet Cong, and the United States. In fact the United States had several allies who fought alongside them in that war – name three countries that deployed troops to Vietnam under their own flag to support the South Vietnamese.

Daily Double: NATO – the North Atlantic Treaty Organization was formed to fight communist expansion in Europe. A similar organization existed to fight expansion in the Pacific – what was it, and who were its members?
