TRIVIA

No takers on last month's questions... but I owe you an answer!

We'll talk about something that I'm rather fond of, which are single shot rifles – two very popular actions in the 19th century were "Rolling Block" and "Falling Block" rifles.

1. What is the difference between a "Rolling Block" and a "Falling Block" rifle?

In a "falling block" action, the breech block seals up the chamber with a heavy chunk of metal sliding up on grooves. In a "rolling block," it seals up the chamber with a piece of metal which pivots into place on a pin.

- 2. *Which is the stronger action? Why?* The falling block, as it is a piece of metal which slides into place, not hinged on a weaker link like a pin.
- 3. Name a popular rolling block action rifle There are not many popular rolling block action rifles anymore, although many Remington rifles in the late 19th century used this type of action.
- 4. *Name a popular falling block action rifle* The two most popular are the Winchester High and Low Wall (Model 1885) and the Ruger #1.



Cross section of a Ruger #1 – the "block" is visible behind the cartridge; it is lowered when the lever is thrown forward.

This month's question is about anti-aircraft weaponry. Throughout World War II, all major armies fielded anti-aircraft weapons, either machine guns mounted in pairs or quads, or cannons such as the American 3" gun or the feared German 88mm FlaK. However, American B-24 pilot Owen Baggett claimed a kill during a mission over Burma with a most unusual weapon. What was it?
