TRIVIA

Last month's topics: <u>Heavily Armed Recreational Vehicles</u>, <u>Sporting History</u>, and <u>New York</u> Governors! Thanks to Rich Allen for his answers to last months questions!

First – Recreational Vehicles for 3 points. The 1980 movie "Stripes" featured the "EM-50," which the Bill Murray character referred as "... one heavily armed recreational vehicle!"

In fact, there was a heavily armed recreational vehicle, of which 500 were made. It was known as the "150 TAP." What was it, who used it, and what were its capabilities?

While it was no "Urban Assault Vehicle" like the EM-50, meet the Vespa 150 TAP:



The Vespa 150 TAP also known as the "Bazooka Vespa" was basically a motorized scooter set up as a pack mule for a 75mm recoilless rifle and ammunition. While not the heaviest gun in the inventory, with its High Explosive Anti-Tank (HEAT) round, it could penetrate 100mm of armor. But as stated, it was a pack mule – it could not fire on the move. I would imagine if it did, its uncontrolled reverse speed would be greater than its maximum controlled forward speed.... Anyway, introduced in 1956 this was a weapon for airborne troops, the scooters would be dropped in pairs, one gun vehicle, one ammo bearer vehicle.

Second – History (1 points). Who was Saxon Pope, and what is the "Pope and Young Club"?

Dr. Saxton T. Pope (1875-1926) is known as the "father of modern bowhunting." His book "Hunting with the Bow and Arrow" remains in print today. The Pope and Young Club, an organization dedicated to bowhunting, is named after him and maintains a North American game record book.

Third – New York Governors for 2 points. Three New York Governors served in uniform during World War II, two in the Army and one in the Navy. Two served in uniform before they were Governor, and one did after. Which served in which branch of the service? Who is the one who donned the uniform AFTER leaving office?

Governor Charles Poletti, 46th Governor of NY, served in office during 1942. After he left the post of Governor, he was appointed a Civil Affairs Officer and was assigned in Italy during WW2 from 1943-1945.

Governor Malcolm Wilson served as a naval officer during WW2, and Governor Hugh Carey served in combat as an infantry officer during the war.

Bonus question (2 points) – This founder of a major package shipping company served as a Marine in the Vietnam War as a platoon leader and forward air controller, being awarded a Silver Star in the process. Who was he?




US Marines in Vietnam. Fred Smith, second from right, would later be the founder of FEDEX and serve as its CEO.
