This weekend we celebrate Independence Day, July 4"- the day in history when the 13 separate
Colonies in America officially united for Independence from all forms of the tyrannical governments of men, specifically against the monarchical government of Great Britain, on the basis of a new Declaration of Independence. King George III is said to have read the document and then flung it behind his throne to the floor, so great was the difference between the free mind and that of the old world monarchs. This document was assembled from all the best thinking of history, the rational thinking of governance and acknowledgement of the self-evident unalienable rights derived from The Creator. But like many famous discoveries, what they discovered was not necessarily what was sought at the time that they started work. So, I ask you – what was it that the Chinese were trying to discover at the time that they discovered gunpowder?




Well, as John W., John D., and Tim pointed out, they were indeed trying to find a formula for "an elixir for immortality." Well, that didn't work out so well. However, as the surprised individuals in the sketch to your left found out, it had an entirely different effect. While there were a number of fire weapons that had been invented previously such as "Greek Fire," and projectile weapons such as the catapult, the invention of gunpowder led to a revolution in military affairs as new technologies took advantage of the potential of this new compound.

So let's move to this month's trivia question. As it is Independence Day weekend, let's look at something uniquely American: "The Star Spangled Banner," and the War of 1812. After Washington was sacked by the British in 1814, with the White House and Capitol burned, the British didn't stop. They continued north and made an amphibious landing outside Baltimore. The sea battle that took place was chronicled in our National Anthem, written by Francis Scott Key while held by the British off shore as the British vessels bombarded Fort McHenry. The land battle which took place at North Point (just east of Baltimore) was led by British General Robert Ross, who when told he was being faced by American militia, reportedly scoffed and said he didn't care if it "rained militia."



Two American militiamen, Privates Daniel Wells and Henry McComas, apprentice saddle makers by trade, by many accounts had a pivotal role in the battle, and some might say had a tremendous impact on American history. What was that role?
