On Saturday, May 6th, there was another 8 hour educational course held here at the clubhouse - the NYS Bowhunter Safety course, taught by Mark Hebert. Five more young people- all 4-H youth- and three adults received their 'Bowhunter Certificate of Qualification', increasing the ranks of people prepared to become good and trained archers, woodsmen and ethical hunters. One more 4-H course, a Survival Course on May 13th taught by member and NYDEC Forest Ranger Michael Bodnar, will make six courses at our club this spring with 4-H graduation to follow on May 15th as noted last month in the Newsletter. This is our privilege as stewards and ambassadors of the shooting sports.

<u>Stewards</u> are faithful caretakers and <u>ambassadors</u> are those who serve a purpose larger than just their own. Owlkill Rod & Gun Club *is both* and is helping 4-H in this work. We will see a growing interest here and in all clubs and organizations working towards the same goal of passing along to others the interest and <u>broad based educational groundwork necessary for safe, informed and ethical participation in shooting sports.</u>

Many of us take for granted the knowledge and capabilities someone entrusted to us by teaching us. We've enjoyed great times afield using this imparted knowledge and hope to pass it along to those coming along after us.

TRIVIA

Last month's questions - thank you to Rich Allen, John D'Allaird, for your responses! Here were the questions:

1. Movies (this is for our Secretary and resident classic movie buff, "The Duke"): In the classic Boer War drama "Breaker Morant" (1980), an Australian officer was tried for unlawfully executing insurgents. When asked by what authority he executed the prisoners, he declared "Rule three-oh-three!" To what was he likely referring?

Rule three-oh-three would be best written as Rule .303, in which case most firearms enthusiasts would immediately recognize .303 as the caliber of the British Martini-Henry, Lee-Enfield and Lee-Metford rifles and carbines used during this particularly nasty colonial war in Southern Africa.

2. Military: US Marines have a number of nicknames, but one of the most enduring is "leatherneck." To what does this refer?


Most descriptions of the term are not definite in its origin. It is believed to originate in the wearing of a high leather-lined neckband or collar around the neck which both kept the posture high and straight, and evidently was also protective of the neck from sword blows. Both British Royal Marines and US Marines claim the title "leatherneck."

3. Presidents: Who was the first President to die in office – and what other distinction does this President hold?

President William Henry Harrison, 9th President of the United States, died of complications from pneumonia 31 days into his Presidency. The former American military officer, and the last President born as a British subject, in addition to being the first to die in office was also the one, by far, with the shortest term as our Chief Executive.

Well, those were some fun ones. Lets see where we take it this month.....

1. Firearms: Many of our Presidents were avid shooters and firearms enthusiasts. Some took their passion a bit farther. President Jackson was evidently fond of dueling at one point in his life, and carried a souvenir of one of his duels with him until his death. What was the souvenir?



Before he was President, and before he was a war hero at New Orleans, Andrew Jackson involved himself in a number of pursuits, one of which was dueling.

2. Military: The youngest Medal of Honor recipient earned his award at 11 and was granted it at 13 – New Yorker Willie Johnston, serving as a drummer boy in the 3rd Vermont Infantry during the Civil War. Who was the youngest awardee during the 20th Century, where did he earn it, and what was his act of valor?



Willie Johnston, Medal of Honor awardee during the Peninsula campaign (1862) was 11 when he earned it and was 13 when it was awarded. Personally recommended by President Lincoln, he was the youngest Medal of Honor recipient.

3. Presidents: President James Madison holds the distinction of being the only President to actually take the field of battle with his troops as Commander in Chief (at the Battle of Bladensburg, during the War of 1812). However, he holds another distinction which is the opposite extreme of that held by President William H. Taft. What is it?
