Greetings sportsmen and women one and all....

We are maturing as a club. This means that there are certain areas we are now in a position to "tighten up" that perhaps we couldn't before. One of the important areas is in membership dues and processing. In the past we were a bit loose in enforcing deadlines on dues payments, but that's been beginning to bite us in the tail, because when we need the ready cash to pay bills, its not there – and that does not serve the interests of our club well.

Another area is providing an alternate way for members who can not support work parties to still support our growth and maintenance efforts.

I am enclosing the updated membership renewal forms with this newsletter, along with the safety rules forms. Here's a summary of what's new:

- 1. Dues and renewals are due no later than the 1st of March. On that day, the combo to the clubhouse and ranges changes.
- 2. Renewals received between 1^{st} of March and 1^{st} of June have a \$20.00 penalty.
- 3. Renewals received after the 1st of June will be treated as a new membership, which means that the applicant will have to appear before the Board of Directors' Meeting and then the next Membership meeting before approval.

Please understand – *the goal is not that we want to collect penalties or have anyone jump through hoops*. The goal is to get membership renewals in before the 1^{st} of March so we can manage our finances and pay the Club's bills. I'm sure I speak for our Chairman of the Board of Directors and our President when I say we would be happy to collect no penalties next year!

- 4. For those who are unable to participate in work details and/or committees, we have provided the OPTION to donate an additional \$25.00 with your renewal which will be allocated towards supplies and materials to support our work parties. In other words, if you can't do some of the physical heavy lifting, let Jackson and Lincoln do the lifting for you.
- 5. As with last year, we are offering the opportunity to pre-purchase Owlkill Lottery tickets for next year. The tickets have been printed and will be ready as stocking stuffers if you like! Pre-purchase, make your life easier, and we'll mail the tickets to you with your new membership card.

TRIVIA

A few answers to this past month's trivia question!!!

As you may recall last month's question.... Due to disagreements with Winchester, John Browning broke away and negotiated his own manufacturing contracts in 1898. In the past, Browning got a flat fee for his designs. He decided he wanted per unit royalties, so if the firearm was a hit, he got a piece of the profits. Winchester disagreed. The weapon that this disagreement surrounded was a new semi-automatic shotgun design which would end up called the Browning Auto-5. When Browning broke away from Winchester, who did he award the manufacturing contract to?

John Wiley got the answer right – the answer was FN – Fabrique Nationale, the Belgian manufacturer

which still maintains a relationship with Browning to this day (check out the BAR and then look at the FNAR – very similar, right?). I will give partial credit however, to Mark Mahoney, for "Remington," as the Remington Model 11 was the same licensed design – however the Remington was not made until about 40 years after FN was making the Auto-5. Ironically, he was going to cut a deal with Remington before FN, however, the president of Remington passed away before the deal was complete! Additional trivia – Savage also licensed the design and manufactured it as the Model 720 and 745.

This week's question – John Browning, designer of the famous Colt 1911 ".45 Auto" was later commissioned to produce a pistol for the French Army. Of course, he'd signed his patents over to Colt for his auto pistol design, so he had to start from scratch in some ways. He died in 1926 before the design was complete. What was the pistol that he came up with, and who finished the design after his passing? Hint – the alternative French name for the pistol they wanted was "*Grand Puissance*."
