Trivia question from last month. During its service life in the US military, how many American companies produced the M1 Carbine?

The answer, by the way is eleven. The eleven major manufacturers of the M1 Carbine during World War II were:

GENERAL MOTORS (marked INLAND DIV.)

WINCHESTER REPEATING ARMS (marked WINCHESTER)

IRWIN-PEDERSON (marked IRWIN-PEDERSON)

SAGINAW STEERING GEAR DIVISION, GENERAL MOTORS (marked SAGINAW S.G.)

UNDERWOOD ELLIOT FISHER (marked UNDERWOOD)

NATIONAL POSTAL METER (marked NATIONAL POSTAL METER)

QUALITY HARDWARE MANUFACTURING CORP. (marked QUALITY H.M.C.)

INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS MACHINES (marked IBM CORP.)

STANDARD PRODUCTS (marked STD. PRO.)

ROCK-OLA MANUFACTURING CORP. (marked ROCK-OLA)

COMMERCIAL CONTROLS CORP. (marked COMMERCIAL CONTROLS)

Some of these manufacturers seem a tad familiar, no doubt. And with the exception of Winchester, not for firearms manufacture!

This month's trivia:

The 45-70 was the US Army's standard cartridge from 1873 through 1892, and was used by some militia units during the Spanish American War. It was replaced by the Army's first smokeless cartridge. What was the cartridge, and what weapon was it used in. Bonus question – what was the last use of the 45-70 for the US military?



Philippine Scouts, supporting US forces during the Philippine War (1899-1902), armed with obsolete Model 1889 Springfield 45-70 rifles. They also carried their trademark northern Philippine "Bolo" knife as a personal weapon for close combat.

Match Starts: 9:30 a.m. Old Timer Match* starts 1:00 p.m

Fees: \$5.00 adults, \$2.00 Juniors (12-18 yrs-must be accompanied by an adult).

Equipment: For All Matches: .22 Cal Rimfire standard or high velocity ammo (no hyper velocity

or Stinger ammo.)

No shooting jackets, gloves, slings or supporting equipment of any kind.

For Silhouette Match (1/5th Scale Targets).

Any.22 cal. Rifle in safe operating condition. Any sights.

For Old Timers Match ($\frac{1}{2}$ scale targets): any unmodified factory .22 cal lever, slide, bolt, break action rifle.

Iron Sights only (includes peep sights). No target or heavy barreled rifles. Old Timers Match will be held in the afternoon following the regular Silhouette Match.

Course of Fire (both Silhouette and Old Timers): 10 shots each at 40, 60 70 & 100 yds.

Animals set up as follows: Chickens - 40 yds; Pigs - 60 yds.; Turkeys - 70 yds, Rams - 100 yds.

Animals are set up in two banks of 5. Time: $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes per bank with a rest period between banks. Shots taken from left to right, top bank first. All shots taken from standing position.
