President's Comments:

Autumn is coming, our season in the woods is soon to begin- has already started for some!

<u>Wonder, contemplation and waxing lyrical</u> come naturally with the shortening of the days. The brevity of all things.

- -Do you go afield for upland game, migratory birds, feather or fur? Woodcock, pheasant, grouse, rabbit, squirrel, duck, goose, turkey? Bobcat, fox or coyote?
- -Or is large game your choice for the hunt: deer, bear or moose?
- -Do you take your dogs to chase the wily raccoon through the moonlit woods at night, your eyes eventually adjusting to see by slits of moonlight through the boughs? Or do you go out stalking for the sheer pleasure of being in the woods- the cold stiff breeze on your face, smells of autumn passing, all at the knife edge of dawn or dusk- magically lit times of the day, the 'golden time' as one friend calls it-making other moments of the day go pale, forgettable, unmemorable?
- -I think most of us 'go afield' for a combination of reasons. Trying to explain it is not so simple. Meat in the freezer is a good, tasty and fulfilling prize but may at times be more a practical or partial answeran attempt to explain the cost of the new gear we just bought vs. so many pounds of meat-when the fullest reason is the need to be in the raw natural places we crave all the yearlong but too seldom experience. Trying to explain it at all may be the wrong thing.
- 'Just take it in' is probably the best attitude.
- -After witnessing the first glimmer of light bathe the chilly morning woods, or the last rays of day overlooking a field, mountain or valley we thought we knew but hadn't seen like this before- the hunting experience gets blended with the deeper, inexplicable fleeting things of the world we live in, nature and passing time. Oddly, the big picture seems clearer under less light at times.

We hold images in our own menu of memories as motivation for going afield.

- -Freezing our extremities, getting soaked to the skin, scraped up, stiff in the bone, busting up gear and battling the ticks are some downsides of our excursions in the woods.
- -But- none of us would change a minute of it after a quick thaw near the fire at day's end- and we cannot fully explain it.

We like the meat but that only in part answers the question as to why we navigate the autumn woods so

eagerly.

-So, as the season soon commences, keep lots of tick repellent on; avoid angry, careless or dangerous persons in the woods; bag what you need... but do not fail to drink in the indescribable color-tinged skies of first or last light, thankful for the stable ground we walk on, the sound and scents of every little thing in the woods... the larger, salient and complete stuff of the hunt.

OK, before we dive into last month's questions, thanks to Rich "RJ" Allen for his responses – 3 for 3 this month Rich!

So last month's questions:

1. Shotguns for three – do the lands cast into rifled slugs help "spin stabilize" them? If they don't, then what stabilizes them?

Full-bore slugs' stabilization comes from the weight on the front of the slug (think of a badminton "birdie" or a Minie Ball). Saboted slugs get their stabilization through the plastic sabot engaging the rifling inside a rifled barrel.
