Now let's dive into last month's questions... Topic was famous veterans.

1. For 2 points - This famous photo was taken during the 1976 baseball season – a couple of protestors decided to burn a flag in the outfield during a game. The flag was rescued before the deed was done by one of the players in that game who happened to be a veteran. Who was the player, and what was his branch of service?



One of my favorite photos and stories, being a vet and a huge baseball fan. As the two jokers on the right were preparing to torch the flag, Chicago Cubs outfielder Rick Monday, a former United

States Marine, dashed over and grabbed the flag before it could be set aflame. When Monday next came to bat, the scoreboard flashed the message "RICK MONDAY... YOU MADE A GREAT PLAY."

2. For 3 points - This famous actor had an extremely distinguished record during World War II, but also flew one mission as an observer during the Vietnam War.



The actor was the great Jimmy Stewart, who by the time of the Vietnam War was a 58 year-old Brigadier General in the Air Force Reserve – and a qualified B-52 pilot. In 1966 he flew on Green-2, a B-52 on an "Arc Light" bombing mission over Vietnam as an observer. There were problems as the plane prepared to land, and the concerned pilot got General Stewart ready to bail out. Luckily, they landed without incident. The picture above shows General Stewart briefing other officers after landing.

3. For 1 point - Although his daughter would become infamous for her anti-war protests, this famous actor refused to serve in World War II by making films, he wanted to join the Navy and fight, saying "I don't want to be in a fake war in a studio." He received the Bronze Star during his three years and an enlisted sailor and then officer.

1. For three points – the image of the AK-47 rifle appears on the flag of one country. What is that country? A not so useful hint- 106 countries use the AK-47 for their military or special forces.

- 3. All Presidents (with two notable exceptions) have provided an annual message, now known as the State of the Union and typically delivered in person. Far more were delivered in writing, however, as opposed to in person. Who are the two presidents who never delivered an annual message or State of the Union, and why?
