Now let's dive into last month's questions... topics were –Allies, Famous Gun Collectors, and Bow Hunting:

1. For three points – this largely Muslim country was the first country to recognize the United States following its independence and signed a peace treaty still in effect today. What was the country?

In December 1777, Moroccan Sultan Muhammad III included the United States in a list of countries to which Morocco's ports were open, so they were the first country with a head of state to publically recognize the United States. In 1786, the Moroccan-American Treaty of Friendship (also known as the Treaty of Marrakesh) was signed, and is the longest unbroken treaty relationship in US history.

2. For two points, this famous sportsman is more famous as a musician. He says he is "just an average shot." He also said "I'm never going to be a great shot because it's not my first interest. Playing the guitar is my prime interest in life. That's what I do. Shooting and fishing are hobbies, and you can never really become a master at a hobby."



This gunslinger is better known as a guitar slinger, and his name is Eric Clapton.

3. For one point – there are three basic methods of bow hunting – what are they?



There are three basic methods for doing this.

Three types of ground bow hunting are still hunting, stalking, and glassing. In still hunting, you move slowly and deliberately until you spot game (and before it spots you). In stalking, the game has been spotted, and you slowly and deliberately maneuver into shooting range and position. Glassing is sitting for a long time at vantage points and spot from afar with binoculars or spotting scopes. Hunting from a stand eliminates the maneuver into shooting range, but anyone who has ever spooked a deer from a stand knows that there is some challenge in getting into shooting position even when stationary!

OK, lets move on to this month's questions! Topics are – the American Civil War, the United States Flag, and pistols!

- 1. For two points Union General Ulysses Grant, was known to wear a common soldier's clothing, not particularly fond of all of the decorum and trappings of being a General. He also hated ceremonies and military music. He said he could only recognize two tunes. What were they?
- 2. For three points The Pledge of Allegiance was first written in 1891 by a Mr. Francis Bellamy, a former New York minister who was trying to sell American flags to public schools to get subscriptions for the Youth's Companion magazine. The Pledge was accompanied by a salute, called the "Bellamy Salute," which has long since been replaced by the hand over the heart. What could be considered odd (or perhaps alarming) about the Bellamy Salute?
- 3. For one point In 2017, the Army selected a replacement for the Beretta M9 (civilian 92FS) pistol, its standard pistol since 1985. What was the replacement, and what is its civilian model?

Look at his trigger finger. It is off the trigger and along the side of the firearm. Even when the you-know-what has hit the fan (in this case, Kasal sustained wounds from seven bullets and 43 pieces of grenade shrapnel) the First Sergeant is keeping the firearm safe. Discipline, my friends – pass it on!
POSTSCRIPT: Kasal survived his injuries, eventually retiring as the I MEF Sergeant Major in 2018.



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
