#### **TRIVIA**

Now let's dive into last month's questions... Topics were America at war in the 70s, pistol hunting, and the Supreme Court.

1. America at War in the 1970s for three points: During the 1970s, the United States and South Korean military executed a real-world operation called OPERATION PAUL BUNYAN in response to a significant provocation. What was the provocation?

Operation PAUL BUNYAN was a heavily armed expedition into the Korean Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) in 1976. On August 18, 1976, two US Army officers were part of a work party to trim a poplar tree in the Joint Security Area. The tree was obstructing the view between a checkpoint and one of its observation posts. A North Korean force attacked the US officers and their South Korean and American enlisted detail. The two American officers were killed. Although American forces increased readiness to DEFCON 3 after the North Korean attack, a restrained show of force was the primary response. A heavily reinforced US Rifle Company, with engineers equipped with chainsaws, returned to the Joint Security Area and removed the tree, a while seven Cobra attack helicopters and transport helicopters with another infantry company embarked circled behind them.

2. Pistol hunting for one point: In 2003, Smith and Wesson unveiled what would be the largest pistol hunting cartridge, suitable for everything in North America and African wild game. What was the cartridge?

The .500 S&W Magnum was designed as a handgun cartridge capable of taking all North American game, and be the most powerful production handgun cartridge to date. It succeeded on both counts!

3. The United States Supreme Court for two points: The oldest justice to serve on the Supreme Court served on the court for almost 30 years, retiring in 1932. He was also a thrice-wounded Civil War veteran who was a brevet Colonel at the war's end. Who was he?

Oliver Wendell Holmes Jr. was an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the US from 1902-1932, serving as Acting Chief Justice briefly in 1930. He retired from the court at the age of 90, the oldest justice in the Court's history. During the Civil War, he served as an officer of the 20<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry, eventually serving on the staff of VI Corps during the Battle of

the Wilderness. He was wounded at the Battle of Ball's Bluff, again at Antietam, and again at Chancellorsville.

OK, for this month, since it is Veterans Day weekend, I'm going to ask some questions about some famous veterans.

1. For 2 points - This famous photo was taken during the 1976 baseball season – a couple of protestors decided to burn a flag in the outfield during a game. The flag was rescued before the deed was done by one of the players in that game who happened to be a veteran. Who was the player, and what was his branch of service?



- 2. For 3 points This famous actor had an extremely distinguished record during World War II, but also flew one mission as an observer during the Vietnam War.
- 3. For 1 point Although his daughter would become infamous for her anti-war protests, this famous actor refused to serve in World War II by making films, he wanted to join the Navy and fight, saying "I don't want to be in a fake war in a studio." He received the Bronze Star during his three years and an enlisted sailor and then officer.
