TRIVIA

Now let's dive into last month's questions... the topics were survival in the woods, survival rifles, and the Vietnam War.

1. For two points – surviving in the woods... there are many forms of edible plant life. If you don't have an identification guide, what color berries should you generally avoid eating?

Okay, so you forgot your survival guide. Meet the "Berry Rule": 10% of white and yellow berries are edible, 50% of red berries are edible, 90% of blue, black, or purple berries are edible, and 99% of aggregate berries (raspberries, blackberries, and wineberries – any with their tightly-packed clusters of fruits) are edible. And as they say at the end of the car commercials – "Your mileage may vary"

2. For one point – survival rifle... Armalite is most famous for being one of the initial manufacturers of the AR-10, predecessor to the AR-15. They also made a survival rifle for pilots. What was its model, caliber, and unique feature?



The AR-7, designed by Eugene Stoner, was a .22LR rifle designed for woods survival. It broke down to four major components, all stored in the stock.

3. For three points – This rescue operation was the "largest, longest, and most complex search and rescue" operation during the Vietnam War. Five aircraft and 11 airmen were lost during the rescue attempt, and another two captured. Although rescue eventually succeeded, it resulted in new techniques and equipment for Combat Search and Rescue.

The rescue of Bat-21 Bravo, the call sign for Lt. Col. "Gene" Hambleton was a major rescue operation following the shoot down of his EB-66 aircraft over North Vietnam. Since bombing campaigns were now involving Strategic Air Command B-52's some of the officers involved in crewing the aircraft had access to very sensitive information, Hambleton among them. The extremely involved rescue was later dramatized in the 1988 film Bat*21 starring Gene Hackmam as Hambleton.

Lets move along to the this month's questions. Topics are America at war in the 70s, pistol hunting, and the Supreme Court.

- 1. America at War in the 1970s for three points: During the 1970s, the United States and South Korean military executed a real-world operation called OPERATION PAUL BUNYAN in response to a significant provocation. What was the provocation?
- 2. Pistol hunting for one point: In 2003, Smith and Wesson unveiled what would be the largest pistol hunting cartridge, suitable for everything in North America and African wild game. What was the cartridge?



Later our oldest Supreme Court Justice, I suspect that this Civil War officer had no idea that his life would eventually lead to his sitting on the most prestigious bench in the country...

3. The United States Supreme Court for two points: The oldest justice to serve on the Supreme Court served on the court for almost 30 years, retiring in 1932. He was also a thrice-wounded Civil War veteran who was a brevet Colonel at the war's end. Who was he?
